We all face many financial decisions in our lives, but buying a house is the biggest purchase
most people ever make. Your challenge in this project is to research five (5) home properties
anywhere in the world, but within a set budget of \$600,000, and then present your findings and
decisions to the class via a Google Slides presentation. The project has FOUR components.
COMPONENT 1 – Choosing a location, defining needs, and making financial decisions
PART A: You need to first decide on the <u>location</u> in which you will search for a home. An old
real estate adage quips that the three most important factors in buying a home are "location
location, location". This is because the location of your home has a tremendous impact on its
present and future value. Research and record these key factors about the town you've choser
using its Chamber of Commerce website and/or other reliable data sources on the internet:
General Information (1 point per item):
Location on a map (provide a screenshot)
2. Crime Rate
3. School Rating
4. Average Temperature
5. Town square mileage
Demographics (1 point per item):
6. Median age
7. Population
8. Male/Female Population
9. Median Income
10. Education

PART B: Now that you've chosen the location, it's time to decide on your specific house requirements. House requirements can significantly affect the price you pay for a home.

COMPONENT 2 – Creating the Presentation

Now that your research is complete, prepare a professional-looking presentation in Google Slides that captures all of your hard work. The presentation will consist of 11 slides that should highlight the information you collected along with pictures that capture the beauty of the location you chose as well the features of your five home choices. Be sure your presentation is visually appealing. All presentation requirements can be found in the grading rubric that follows:

COMPONENT 2 Grading Rubric:

Slide Content	Point Value	Points Awarded
<u>Title Slide</u> : Include the project name and your name(s). The background of this slide should be an actual picture of your desired town or an attraction located in the town (do not use a photo of a map).	5	
Slide 2: The second slide should be a description of the town you chose to live in and must include all of the items listed in Component 1 Part A.	10	
Slide 3: The third slide should be your list of home requirements from Component 1 Part B.	10	
 Slides 4 - 8: Each slide will feature one of your five home options from Component 1 Part C. Each slide should contain AT LEAST two pictures of each home along with the following information: Listing realtor, price, address Number of bedrooms & bathrooms Lot size House Type & Style How much money you'll need for a down payment (multiply 20% times the listing price) 	125 (25 per slide)	
Slide 9: The ninth slide should display the checklist you created in Component 1 Part C.	15	
Slide 10: The ninth slide should be the "reveal" slide to display the home you chose along with THREE reasons why you chose it.	15	
<u>Final Slide</u> : Your last slide should highlight information you learned during your research that was either a surprise or something you found interesting.	15	
Overall Slide Design: The presentation should be visually appealing with a good use of photos and color. It should also be easy to read.	15
